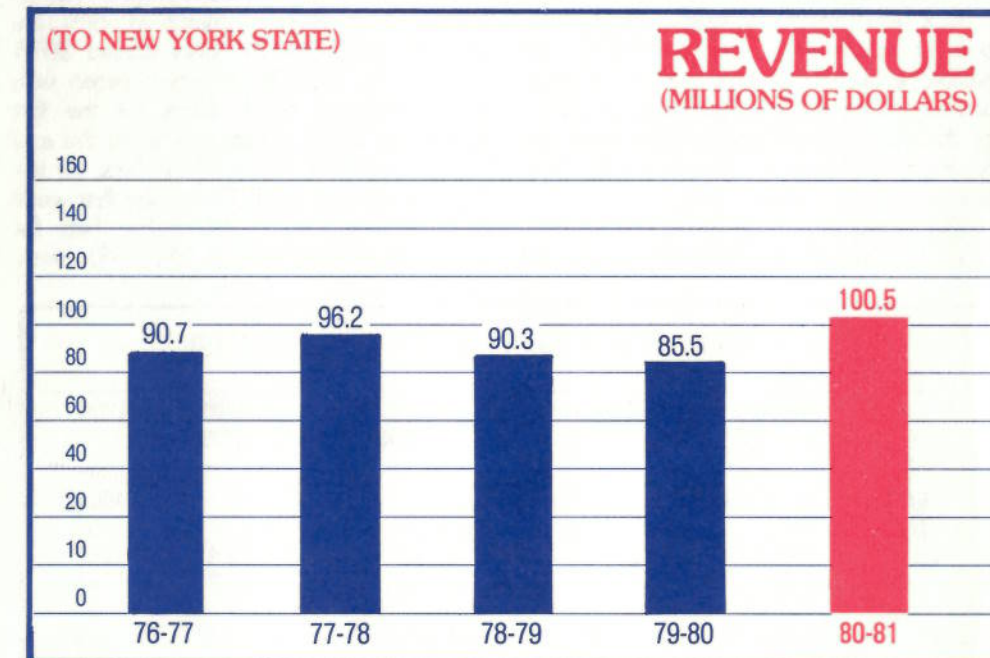
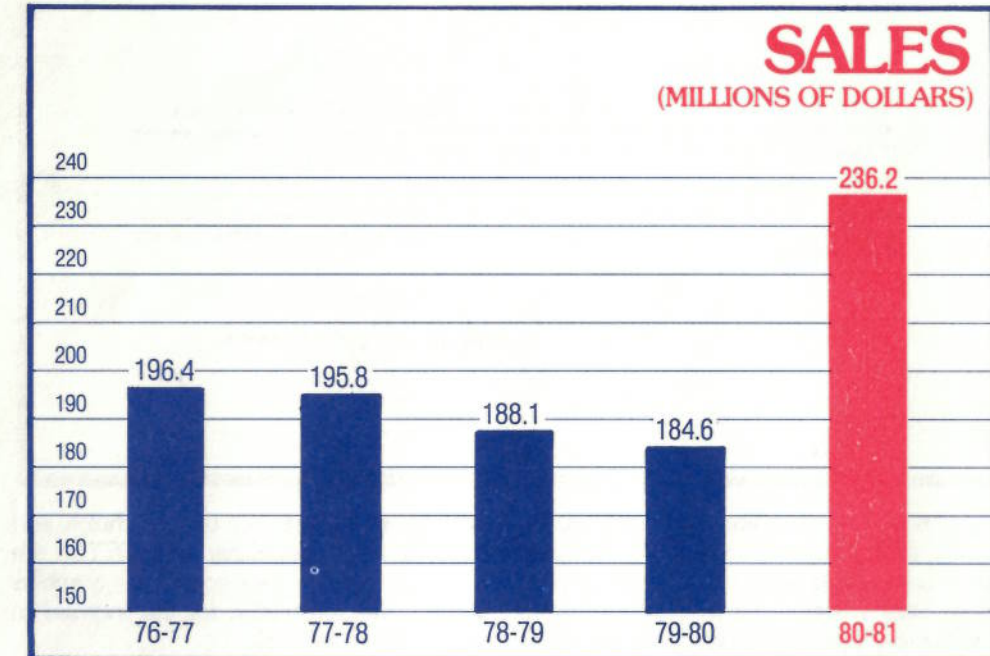

Sales of \$236.2 million in Fiscal 1980-81, up by 27.9 percent from the previous year, set a new single year record for the New York State Lottery. This brought total sales for the four-and-a-half years of operation to \$1001.1 million.

As a result, revenues realized for the support of education in Fiscal 1980-81 also peaked at a new all-time high for a single year of \$100.5 million. Total revenues raised by the New York State Lottery since the resumption of sales on September 8, 1976, reached \$463.2 million.

The introduction of NEW YORK'S NUMBERS, a daily lottery in which players bet

on a three-digit number of their choice, and the increasing popularity of LOTTO, the Lottery's weekly pick-your-own numbers game, were responsible for the increase in sales in Fiscal 1980-81.

NEW YORK'S NUMBERS went on sale on September 2, 1980. By March 31, 1981, the end of Fiscal 1980-81, sales totaled \$65.4 million. The NUMBERS, which began with 547 automated ticket sellers for the first week, had 1,048 agents on-line by the end of the fiscal year. Total on-line bets, for the NUMBERS and LOTTO, for the first week were \$810,827.50. Total on-line bets for the week ending March 28, 1981, were

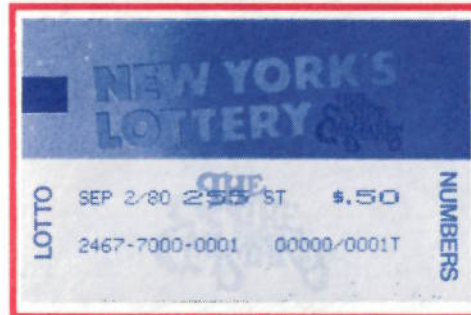

\$3,554,173. The NUMBERS paid out more than \$29 million in prizes to its players, averaging nearly \$1 million a week.



LOTTO sales of \$77.9 million in Fiscal 1980-1981 were up \$28.7 million, or 58 percent, from the previous year's \$49.2 million.

The Instant Game, in which players rub off covered boxes to determine if they have won, remained a staple of the Lottery game offerings, although it showed a decline, to \$92.9 million, in Fiscal Year 1980-81, from \$118.2 million the year before.

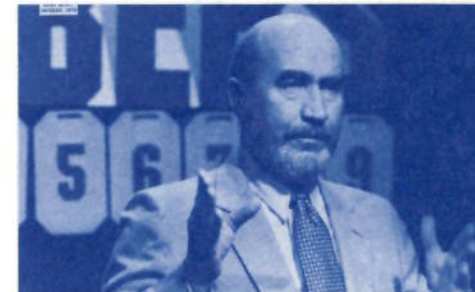
In Fiscal 1980-81, five new Instant games were introduced: WINNING HAND II, BASEBALL III, GOLD MINE, DOUBLE MONEY and POT O'GOLD.

As of March 31, 1981, the New York Lottery had awarded cash prizes and free tickets valued at more than \$450 million to more than 125 million winners. Cash prizes ranged from one dollar to the largest lottery prize to that date of \$2,274,290, won in LOTTO by Clyde Murphy of Brooklyn in June, 1980.

The Lottery made 12 new "millionaires" in Fiscal 1980-81, bringing to 45 the number of persons who have won a million dollars or more in a single prize since September, 1976. The names and photographs of these new "millionaires" are included on the back page of this report.

From September, 1976, to March 31, 1981, more than \$60 million was paid to small businessmen throughout the State. This is the 6 percent commission paid to Lottery agents for their efforts in selling Lottery tickets. More than \$15 million was paid in

this period to banks and Lottery distributors as distribution fees for Lottery tickets. At the same time, hundreds of jobs were created in the private sector in New York. These included sales and accounting personnel hired by Lottery Distributors, marketing and sales collection forces, clerical and data processing personnel hired by contractors, etc. Real estate fees and telephone line charges for the automated ticket sales system added millions more to the New York economy.
